

Analyzing Perspective	<p>When asked about a character's perspective, I can talk about how a character feels in a scene.</p> 	<p>When asked about a character's perspective, I can talk about how the character feels about something important to the story (other characters, the setting, an event).</p> <p>I use what the character does, says, and thinks to support my ideas.</p>	<p>When asked about a character's perspective, I can talk about how the character feels about something important in the story (other characters, the setting, an event).</p> <p>I use everything I know about the character's life experience (where he or she is from, what groups he or she belongs to) to explain why the character feels this way.</p>	<p>When asked, I can talk about how different characters have different perspectives about events, characters, settings, and issues.</p> <p>I consider the characters' different life experiences as well as the roles they play in their lives (daughter, friend, student, and so on) to compare and explain their perspectives.</p>	<p>When asked, I can compare characters' perspectives about key story elements.</p> <p>I consider the characters' different experiences and roles in the story to compare and explain their perspectives.</p> <p>I also notice when characters may represent types of people and typical perspectives, or when characters develop perspectives that are surprising.</p>
